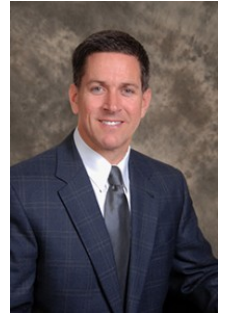

Our board has made great strides in focus on the imperative aspects of refinement (post relocation and expansion by four-fold in 2013).



We have increased our residents' high school equivalency graduation rate by 20% and more than 78% of the women are employed than at any other time since our expansion to the new facility.

As we serve over 150 women annually, we have the empirical data that provides on-going feedback on the success of our programs and staff's capabilities. With each day comes a new opportunity to help decrease the recidivism rate of mothers that commit non-violent felonies and hold the key to future generations.

We are passionate about continuing to provide a stable environment that is packed full of growth and opportunity.

What is Craine House?

Giving women a second chance in a unique, non-traditional work-release program, Craine House provides them a safe and structured, homelike setting while living here with their pre-school children. Moms and kids live together at Craine House, women are provide opportunities to learn job readiness and employable skills, earn a GED, learn positive parenting skills and get help and support for addictions. In our 35+ year history, over 650 women have been given this second chance; to transform their lives and the lives of their children, thus returning to the community prepared to make a meaningful contribution to society and maintain a solid family structure; at less cost and with a lower recidivism rate than traditional incarceration programs.

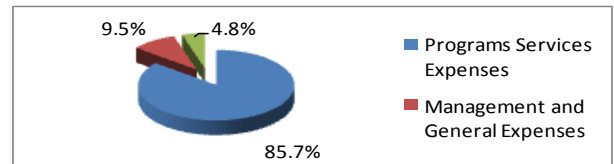
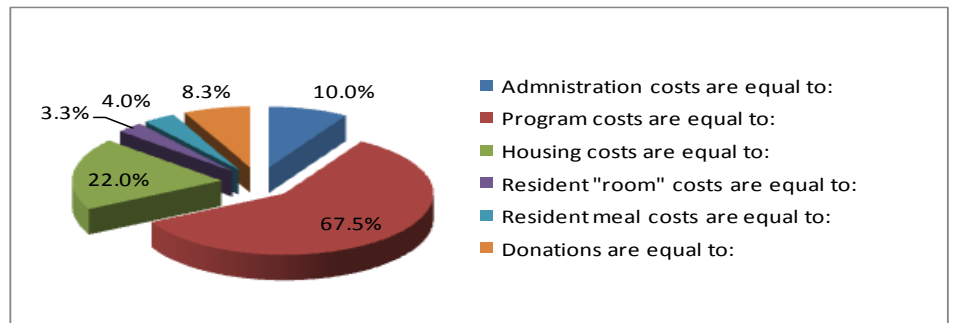
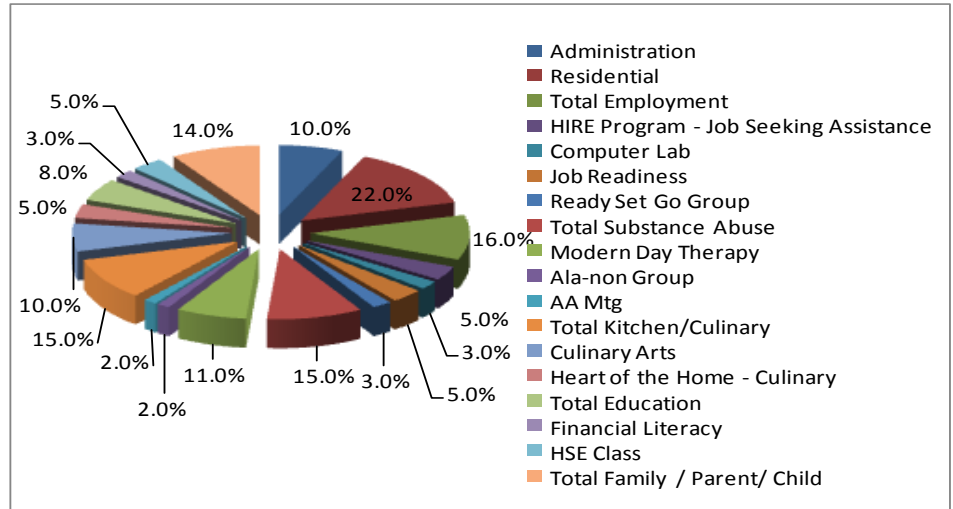

6130 Michigan Road Project

In September 2014, Craine House completed the final stage of our expansion and opened the remaining wings of our facility. The completed section housed an additional 16 resident rooms, allowing us to serve up to 40 women and their children. The new wing also houses the following rooms for programming:

- A non-denominational chapel to provide our residents with a space for reflection and meditation
- A computer lab/classroom to assist the women with job searches, job readiness, and HSE or college course work
- A library for both the women and children where they can find books, puzzles, and board games
- A multi-purpose room to provide a meeting space for various on-site programming, such as AA and Al-Anon
- A child development room for the children to play, which also provides evening daycare and a space for parenting classes
